An organizer who will lead the planning

A moderator who will lead cafe discussion (These can be the same person)



A speaker.

Find them at universities, government research institutions, professional associations, museums, engineering firms and local publications.

- **Approach 1:** Identify a speaker and work with them to select a topic related to *Fabric* that connects with their expertise
 - Find speakers at universities, government agencies, museums, professional organizations, businesses, etc.
 - Qualities to look for:
 - personable, friendly, enthusiastic
 - broadly knowledgeable about the topic
 - comfortable answering questions
 - able to discuss research and concepts without using jargon









- Approach 2: Select a topic and find an appropriate speaker
 - Fabric themes include: Time, Space, Quantum Mechanics, and Multiverse.
 - Some topic ideas:
 - Is Time travel possible?
 - Visualizing different dimensions: The art of higher dimensions
 - Dark Energy: Detecting and studying the invisible
 - The Big Rip: How will the universe end, in a whimper or a bang?
 - What is Real? Quantum mechanics and the nature of reality
 - Making Little Bangs: How particle accelerators explore the quantum world
 - Multiverse: science, science fiction, metaphysics, philosophy, or religion?





Location, location, location



Pick a name, time, and place

- Give your café a memorable, catchy name.
- Set a time with your audience in mind: when would they be available?
- Pick an accessible venue: coffeehouse, pub, bookstore, student center, mall, etc.
- Keep the venue's logistics in mind: A/V? Easy to get to? Flexible seating arrangements?, etc.

- Use electronic networks and social media: Facebook, Twitter, Meet-up, etc.
- Post to online listservs, calendars, and electronic bulletin boards.
- Send a calendar listing to your local papers and professional bulletins/newsletters.

Prepare your speaker

- E-mail, meet, or talk with your speaker before the cafe
- Be specific about his/her role getting a conversation started.
- Emphasize the informal atmosphere

(not a lecture: no podium, no slides, etc.).

Fine-tune



- Recruit volunteers (very helpful for helping set up and run cafes)
 - Contact universities, science-related businesses, student organizations, etc.

Finalize details

- Photocopy/gather handouts, evaluation, brochures, etc.
- Decide how you will use the FABRIC coasters.
- Review any video and check any required equipment.
- Visit the venue, if possible, and double-check the date, time, set-up, AV, etc.
- Confirm your speaker's availability. Restate the following:
 - ▶ Give brief topic overview to start a conversation, about 10 minutes.
 - Dress casually.
 - Come prepared with some general discussion questions.

Spread the word

- Continue promoting your café by printing flyers and posting them in strategic locations.
- Send *FABRIC*-specific online reminders with the final details to potential audience members.









- NOVA has printed a set of 20 cosmic cafe coasters, each with a separate multiple-choice question.
- There are three main times for café attendees to use the questions printed on the coasters:
 - while settling in, as a fun game to play with others at the table
 - during the conversation, as a source of interesting questions to ask the speaker
 - after the event, as an easy way to get to the FABRIC website and further explore the café topic

✓ Arrive Early

- Check A/V, seating arrangements, video projector/monitor, etc.
- Set out forms, sign-up sheet, giveaways, coasters, handouts, etc.

√ Break the Ice

- Encourage participants to answer the questions on *The Fabric of the Cosmos* coasters.
- Show video clip

√ Start a Conversation

- Introduce the speaker and let him/her pick up where the video left off.
- Engage audience with FABRIC-specific discussion starters. (See FABRIC website)
- Watch audience reactions. Pick up on things that are of particular interest.
- Encourage audience members to answer each other's questions.

√Wrap Up

- Circulate sign-up sheet and evaluation.
- Announce upcoming related cafés and events.
- Encourage continued discussion.





Evaluate your Cafe

- Take notes for the next time you do a café.
 - What got the biggest reaction? Sparked the most conversation?
 - Did the audience look comfortable and engaged?
 - Did conversation continue after the official end of the café?
 - Would you work with the speaker again?
- Complete questionnaire to pinpoint how we can improve our resources and support.
 - Complete the Inverness café organizer's evaluation form.




